

6-year trends show Significant Improvements

Dear Hamilton resident,

The Board of Directors and volunteer participants of the 13 Hamilton Industrial Environmental Association (HIEA) member companies are pleased to share the results of our first-ever Environmental Survey. The Survey includes performance data related to air, water and waste management of HIEA member companies from 1996 to the end of 2001. HIEA member companies have provided key environmental data allowing us to track our historical environmental performance and improvements. The following are some highlights of our progress:

Air

- 16% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions
- 31% reduction in total emissions of particulate matter
- 20% reduction in nitrogen oxides emissions

Water

- 76% reduction in suspended solids discharged into the Harbour
- 11% reduction in city water use
- 38% reduction in total metals discharged in the Harbour

Land

- almost double the purchase of recycled materials.

We are pleased that the first view of our performance as an organization shows significant improvements in a number of key environmental performance indicators. These advancements result from over \$675 million invested by HIEA companies on environmental capital and operating expenses from 1996 to 2001. Bearing in mind that HIEA members produced significantly more products in 2001 than in 1996, our successes are noteworthy.

In addition to the Environmental Survey results, HIEA members continue to demonstrate strong environmental commitment and action in many other ways:

- Investing in a multi-year "green belting program" - planting dozens of trees that clean the air by removing wind-blown dust and, at the same time, help beautify neighbourhoods
- Donating \$40,000 over the last three years as the sole sponsor of outdoor environmental education for Hamilton's lower-city elementary school students both for three years running
- Sponsoring Hamilton's Earth Day and helping organize Hamilton's Commuter Challenge,
- Establishing and overseeing a very active and dedicated Community Advisory Panel - more than 20 active local environmental advocates, neighbourhood association representatives and other caring volunteers, who meet monthly and are dedicated to improving Hamilton's environment
- Participating directly in 16 other environmental associations and improvement initiatives
- Maintaining internationally accepted standards for environmental management systems and environmental reduction programs (e.g. ISO 14001 or Responsible Care).

Together with community support, we look forward to continued progress.

HIEA's Green Hamilton Committee continues to be active in greenbelting projects throughout the Community.

HIEA has successfully implemented a number of initiatives every year since 1999 focused on planting trees and shrubs to reduce wind-blown dust and help beautify local neighbourhoods. Through these efforts we have spent almost \$100,000 in addition to what individual member companies have done on their own.

The year 2002 saw the successful completion of the Mahoney Park tree-planting project. This project was a joint venture with Orlick Industries, with the assistance of the City of Hamilton. The final dedication ceremony took place in May.

Continuing sponsorship of Green Venture's Community Tree Planting initiative was also a priority in 2002.

Another ongoing project of the Green Hamilton Committee is the beautification of the Hamilton Beach Community. In 2002, Green Hamilton was able to support the Hamilton Beach Preservation Committee's project of greening the canal entrance to the Beach area. A feature of the entranceway is a ship's anchor, donated by the Hamilton Port Authority.





The Green Hamilton Committee also supported the Hamilton Harbour Heritage Tree Project. This project, a joint venture between the Royal Botanical Gardens and the City of Hamilton, is dedicated to the collection of heritage tree seeds, propagation of these trees and eventual planting around Hamilton Harbour.

The Green Hamilton Committee's support of the City of Hamilton's North East Gateway tree planting and improvement continued in 2002. Further details of the planting sites are being developed with proposals for artwork and recommendations for landscaping and visual improvements for industries in the northeast area of the city.





Third Annual Commuter Challenge a Hit

Participants saved money, reduced stress and cut back on harmful vehicle emissions.

From June 3rd to 9th 2002, 2,200 people from 45 Hamilton organizations participated in the third annual Commuter Challenge. They bused, biked, carpooled, walked, jogged, in-line skated and even canoed to work. By leaving their cars at home for the week, they logged 196 thousand kilometres of pollution-free travel, cutting Hamilton's vehicle emissions by an estimated 48 thousand kilograms!

The Commuter Challenge is part of a national campaign to help reduce the amount of single-occupancy vehicles – one of the leading causes of smog – on Canada's roads. It's a week-long friendly competition between Canadian cities to see which one can cut its air pollution the most by using active and sustainable modes of transportation.

More than 120 employees from HIEA member companies and HIEA's Community Advisory Panel members participated in this year's Challenge. HIEA member company employees were responsible for reducing 11,500 kg of air pollution through their participation. Four of the six local individual winners in the challenge were Dofasco's Lulu Burszyn, Conrad Grabowski, Steve Leake and Nino Di Fillippo, who cycled 918 km, diverting 224 kilograms of emissions.

HIEA was one of 18 organizations that supported the Challenge through generous donations of time, resources, prizes and over \$100,000 in program support.

Hamilton placed 13th per capita out of 34 participating communities in 2002. Let's move up in the rankings this year.

Jim Hill, Dale Brown, Pat Thies and Students tested their environmental knowledge


by answering progressively more questions and despite the challenge, three students reached the \$25 grand prize level.



HIEA Educational Outreach Update

For the third consecutive year, HIEA helped fund the Primary Environmental Outdoor Education Program organized by the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board.

As part of the science and technology curriculum, 1,200 grade 1, 2 and 3 students from core city elementary schools, plus their teachers and parent/community volunteers, participated in exciting and adventurous outdoor education activities during the winter, spring and fall of 2002.

During their half-day visit to the Dave Brown Outdoor Education Centre, located behind George R. Allan Public School, students explored the local habitat. They examined forest, field and stream ecosystems. To better understand sustainability, the students conducted specific investigations, role-played and participated in organized activities. For many, it was a unique learning experience, and their first time "connecting" to a natural forest habitat.
