



Moving Forward with Improvements to Local Environment



HIEA Greenbelting Project successfully completes first two planting sites

Based on the advice of our Community Advisory Panel (CAP), HIEA identified the need for increased tree planting efforts in the north east quadrant of Hamilton as a top priority for action to reduce air-borne particulate. The Green Hamilton Project was established as a result, with representatives from HIEA, the community, and the City of Hamilton working towards the development of a long-term planting strategy.

In its first year of activity, The Green Hamilton Project accomplished the following:

- Established a process for public nomination of sites and site selection criteria.
- Received public nominations for over 80 sites.
- Identified 12 sites for planting activities over the next three years.
- Planted a row of Columnar Maple trees on Division Street to act as a wind and dust break beside an industrial parking lot.
- Planted ten Norway Maple trees as part of the renovation project for North Central Community Park on Wentworth Street North at Mars Avenue.
- Established a 50% subsidy for the existing City tree planting program to encourage private planting in the north east.

This project has now blossomed from its early nurturing stage, and we'll report on its progress. Many thanks to Maple Tree Farms of Milton for this year's tree contributions, as well as the encouragement and support we are receiving from other local nurseries for this project.

As we complete our first official year of operation, I'm pleased with the progress made by the Hamilton Industrial Environmental Association (HIEA).

In addition to the successful launch of the HIEA organization and our first community initiative, to develop a number of greenbelting sites in and around the city's industrial core area, HIEA has achieved a number of other successes:

- Developed one, two and three year plans and budgets for community activities.
- Participated in 1999 Earth Day program at Copps Coliseum, including sponsorship of two \$100 awards.
- Identified 12 greenbelting sites and completed planting of 2 locations.
- Participated in activities of the: Hamilton Air Quality Initiative (HAQI), Hamilton Air Quality Implementation Committee (HAQIC) and Bay Area Restoration Committee (BARE).
- Supported an application by McMaster University to develop sustainable community research.
- Developed environmental reporting protocol among HIEA member companies and began to establish baseline data to measure improvement progress.
- Sponsored attendance at the Upwind/Downwind Conference by HIEA Community Advisory Panel.
- Held regular monthly meetings of the Community Advisory Panel to provide educational information and address questions and concerns.
- Added Stelwire to the HIEA corporate membership.

As we enter the new millennium, these initiatives have provided a good start towards accomplishing our mandate... "to improve the local environment - air, land and water - through joint and individual activities and by partnering with the community to enhance future understanding of environmental issues and help establish priorities for action".

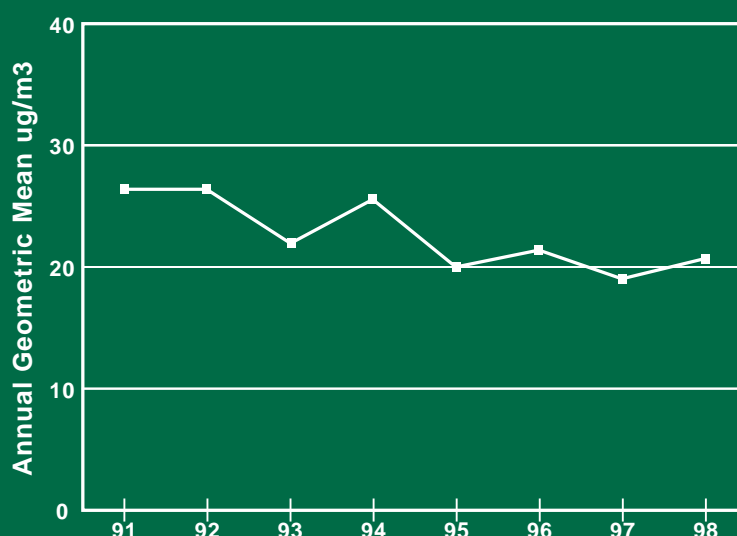

AIR QUALITY UPDATE

Inhalable Particulate
Reduced by 19%
over the past 8 years!

The Ministry of Environment established an early Smog Plan for Ontario which targeted a 10% reduction in inhalable particulate by 2015. Hamilton's air quality has actually improved by almost twice the target amount, 18 years ahead of schedule. Slight increases since 1997 reflect Hamilton's current busy economy. The Hamilton Air Quality Improvement Committee, with which HIEA participates, is establishing Emission Reduction Working Group activities to generate improvement towards new, more stringent targets.

With 93 employees working at its Hamilton facility, CanAmera Foods is the largest processor of oilseeds in Canada. The Hamilton plant processes approximately 1,000,000 tons of soybeans and canola seed per year.
